

## First-Aid Checklist

Basic care: Prepackaged first-aid kits available at REI	typically contain many of the following items:
<ul> <li>Antiseptic wipes (benzalkonium chloride (BZK)-based</li> <li>Antibacterial ointment (e.g., bacitracin)</li> <li>Tincture of benzoin (bandage adhesive)</li> <li>Assorted adhesive bandages (fabric preferred)</li> <li>Butterfly bandages/adhesive wound-closure strips</li> <li>Gauze pads (various sizes)</li> <li>Nonstick sterile pads</li> <li>Medical adhesive tape (10-yd. roll, min. 1" width)</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>wipes preferred; alcohol-based OK)</li> <li>Blister treatment (e.g., Moleskin, 2nd Skin, Glacier Gel)</li> <li>Ibuprofen/other pain-relief medication</li> <li>Insect-sting relief treatment (e.g., AfterBite)</li> <li>Antihistamine to treat allergic reactions</li> <li>Splinter (fine-point) tweezers</li> <li>Safety pins</li> <li>Comprehensive first-aid manual or information cards</li> </ul>
<i>Comprehensive care:</i> Carry all of the basic items listed above; add items below based on anticipated needs. <b>Note:</b> The list below is intentionally extensive; rarely will a single kit include every item shown here.	
Wound coverings	
<ul> <li>Rolled gauze</li> <li>Rolled, stretch-to-conform bandages</li> <li>Elastic wrap</li> <li>Hydrogel-based pads</li> <li></li></ul>	<ul> <li>First-aid cleansing pads with topical anesthetic</li> <li>Hemostatic (blood-stopping) gauze</li> <li>Liquid bandages</li> <li>Oval eye pads</li> <li></li></ul>
Medications/treatments	
<ul> <li>Hand sanitizer (BKZ- or alcohol-based)</li> <li>Aloe vera gel (sun exposure relief)</li> <li>Aspirin (primarily for response to a heart attack)</li> <li>Antacid tablets</li> <li>Throat lozenges</li> <li>Lubricating eye drops</li> <li>Loperamide tablets (for diarrhea symptoms)</li> <li></li></ul>	<ul> <li>Poison ivy/poison oak preventative</li> <li>Poison ivy/poison oak treatment</li> <li>Glucose or other sugar to treat hypoglycemia</li> <li>Oral rehydration salts (e.g., CeraLyte)</li> <li>Antifungal foot powder</li> <li>Prescription medications (e.g., antibiotics)</li> <li>Injectable epinephrine to treat allergic reactions (e.g., EpiPen, Twinject)</li> <li></li> </ul>
Tools	
<ul> <li>Knife (or multi-tool with knife)</li> <li>Paramedic shears (blunt-tip scissors)</li> <li>Safety razor blade (or scalpel w/#15 or #12 blade)</li> <li>Finger splint(s)</li> <li>SAM splint(s)</li> <li>Cotton-tipped swabs</li> <li>Standard oral thermometer</li> <li>Low-reading (hypothermia) thermometer</li> <li>Irrigation syringe with 18 gauge catheter</li> <li>Magnifying glass</li> <li>Small mirror</li> <li></li></ul>	<ul> <li>Medical/surgical gloves (nitrile preferred; avoid latex)</li> <li>Triangular cravat bandage</li> <li>Steel sewing needle with heavy-duty thread</li> <li>Needle-nose pliers with wire cutter</li> <li>Headlamp (preferred) or flashlight</li> <li>Whistle (pealess preferred)</li> <li>Duct tape (small roll)</li> <li>Small notepad with waterproof pencil or pen</li> <li>Medical waste bag (plus box for sharp items)</li> <li>Waterproof container to hold supplies and meds</li> <li>Emergency heat-reflecting blanket</li> <li></li></ul>
Personal-care, other items	
<ul> <li>Sunscreen</li> <li>Lip balm</li> <li>Insect repellent (plus headnet, if needed)</li> <li></li></ul>	<ul> <li>Biodegradable soap</li> <li>Water-disinfection system</li> <li>Collapsible water sink or basin</li> <li></li></ul>
